### Independent Auditor's Report

To the Board of Directors of  
**Shanti Project**  
San Francisco, California

I have audited the accompanying statement of financial position of Shanti Project, (a California nonprofit organization) as of June 30, 2010, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses and cash flows for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the management of Shanti Project (the "Project"). My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on my audit.

I conducted my audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that I plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. I believe that my audit provides a reasonable basis for my opinion.

In my opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial positions of the Project as of June 30, 2010, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, I have also issued my report dated January 18, 2011, on my consideration of the Project's internal control over financial reporting and on my tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of my testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* and should be considered in assessing the results of my audit.

My audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the basic financial statements of the Project taken as a whole. The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal awards is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by U. S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations*, and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in my opinion, is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

**1. ORGANIZATION**

The Shanti Project (the “Project”) was founded in 1974. The Project exists to enhance the health, quality of life and well-being of people living with life-threatening illnesses. Each year, the Project serves over 2,000 women and men living with HIV/AIDS and over 450 living with breast cancer, many of whom are low-income and medically underserved. The Project provides culturally and linguistically competent Care Navigation, basic in-home assistance including practical and emotional support through trained staff and long-term volunteer care-givers, as well as health education, wellness and survivorship classes and events. Founded by Dr. Charlie Garfield at the UCSF Cancer Institute, the Project was one of the first-ever volunteer organizations to work with terminally-ill individuals, and later became one of the very first community-based HIV/AIDS organizations in the world. For so many clients, the Project represents the difference between zero and one—the difference between a client having to face a life-threatening illness alone or having at least one caring presence at his or her side.

**HIV/AIDS Services**

The Project’s HIV/AIDS Services program targets San Francisco's most challenged and at-risk HIV+ communities: the socially isolated, the homeless or marginally housed, communities of color, women, the trans communities, the aging community, individuals challenged with mental health and/or substance use issues, individuals co-infected with other diseases (such as Hepatitis C), individuals with complex/high-needs issues, the newly diagnosed, and residents of neighborhoods where HIV and poverty are co-prevalent. The program offers care navigation, information and referral, peer and client advocacy, outreach, peer support volunteer matches, a range of free activities and events, educational workshops, support groups, and a drop-in center. HIV Services has two contractual collaborations (St. Mary's Medical Center and Westside Community Services) and maintains direct linkages with the range of medical, mental health, and social service agencies within the San Francisco continuum of care.

In addition, the Project's newest program targets MSM (men who have sex with men) individuals with a diagnosis of cancer. Services are currently the provision of an ongoing support group occurring twice monthly, care navigation, and matches with trained peer support volunteers. This is the only such program targeting the MSM community in San Francisco. Services are also available to the trans community and are available to all individuals with cancer, regardless of HIV/sero status.

**LifeLines Program**

LifeLines is San Francisco's most organized and sustained effort to serve underserved populations of women with breast cancer from diverse ethnic and cultural communities. The program provides a one-of-a-kind direct service approach which can be delivered in non-clinical settings, including a client's home, hospital room or our office. Integral to the success of LifeLines is the ability to provide all interaction with our clients directly in English, Spanish, Cantonese and Mandarin. The quality of staff-client relationships is further enhanced because all staff is trained in the Shanti Model of Peer Support™, a non-directive, humanistic and client-centered mode of communication.

LifeLines' staff follows clients from diagnosis through active treatment and beyond, making sure that the continuum of care is maintained between medical providers and clients for treatment and follow-up care, as well as palliative/end-of-life support. Care Navigation services provide culturally/linguistically competent, individualized care advocacy, including: translation services; assistance with applying for social services, emergency funds for rent/utilities and childcare needs; mammography support services; appointment transportation and accompaniment. In addition, we offer free health education and survivorship activities year-round to encourage self-advocacy and peer support.

**The L.I.F.E. Program**

The L.I.F.E. program ("L.I.F.E." being an acronym for Learning Immune Function Enhancement) promotes the health of persons living with HIV/AIDS and other life threatening diseases through compassionate and culturally competent health education and counseling programs, training of health professionals, and research on the role of psychological factors in health.

The L.I.F.E. program is offered across the country, at more than 15 sites, and provides implementation support, curriculum development, technical assistance, and an easily accessible informational website to community-based agencies and government providers who wish to implement the L.I.F.E. workshop.

**The L.I.F.E. Program (Continued)**

The Project provides the L.I.F.E. program in San Francisco (called "Positive L.I.F.E.") and primarily targets MSM population, although services have some availability for women, the trans community, and heterosexuals. Positive L.I.F.E. promotes the health of its participants through a wide range of single and multi session workshops and individual health counseling and risk reduction support. All program activities are based on engaging participants with the role of bio-psycho-social cofactors in health and are designed with the common goals of assisting individuals in reducing risk behavior that might transmit HIV, increasing participants' adherence to medication protocols, increasing their psychological functioning, and enhancing immunity and health. The program offers 12 and 16 week multi-session workshops. Positive L.I.F.E. has several long-standing partners and maintains direct linkages with the range of medical, mental health, and social service agencies within the San Francisco continuum of care.

**HIV Health Services Planning Council**

The HIV Health Services Planning Council (HHSPC) prioritizes all service categories within the San Francisco EMA ("Eligible Metropolitan Area", comprising San Francisco, Marin, and San Mateo counties) and allocates resources/dollar amounts to each service category. The Council also conducts regular community-wide needs assessments and targeted focus groups to assess current areas of need and to maintain quality assurance protocols. The HHSPC Support program provides administrative oversight and support, education, and training to council members, all of whom are volunteers and are individuals living with HIV, service providers, and/or government representatives. HHSPC Support also provides information and public policy assistance to any interested parties including service providers, other community bodies, governmental agencies, and individuals living with HIV.

**Volunteer Services Program**

The Volunteer Services Program offers opportunities for members of the community to be of service, to put their compassion, their skills, and their interests into action to support people living with the challenges of HIV/AIDS and breast cancer. Volunteers are trained to provide emotional support and practical assistance to individuals living with life-threatening illnesses, using the internationally recognized the Shanti Model of Peer Support™. Volunteers serve clients through one-on-one client/volunteer matches, short-term or one-time only support, our drop-in center, our activities program and by offering workshops and classes. The Project has also trained over 600 volunteer organizations worldwide in how to provide compassionate service to clients with life-threatening illnesses and/or at the end-of-life. Over 250 the Project's volunteers provide emotional and peer support services to people living with HIV/AIDS and Breast Cancer every year. And there are over 15,000 men and women in and around the Bay Area who have been the Project's volunteers in the past.

**2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

**Basis of Accounting**

The financial statements of the Project have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting whereby revenues are recognized when earned and expenses as incurred.

**Cost Reimbursement Contracts**

Grant revenue from federal, state and county contracts is recognized based on the terms of the respective contracts. Revenue from government agencies for contract services provided by the Project to third-party organizations is recognized upon completion of services and is reflected as "Governmental Contracts Revenue" in the accompanying Statement of Activities.

**Concentration of Revenue**

The Project receives approximately 61% of its revenue from governmental sources.

**Basis of Presentation**

Net assets of the Project and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

**Unrestricted Net Assets** - Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed stipulations. Also, contributions that are restricted by the donor are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets if the restrictions expire (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished) in the reporting period in which the revenue is recognized.

**Temporarily Restricted Net Assets** - Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that may or will be met, either by actions of the Project and/or passage of time. When a restriction expires, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions.

**Permanently Restricted Net Assets** - Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that they be maintained permanently by the Project. Generally, the donors of these assets permit the Project to use all or part of the income earned on any related investments for general or specific purposes.

**Fair Value Measurements**

The Project reports its fair value measurements using a three level hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs used to measure fair value. This hierarchy, established by generally accepted accounting standards, requires that entities maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs when measuring fair value. The three levels of inputs used to measure fair value are as follows:

Level 1 - Quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets to which the organization has access at the measurement date.

Level 2 - Inputs other than quoted prices included in level 1 that are observable for assets or liabilities, either directly or indirectly. Level 2 inputs include quoted prices in markets that are not active, or other inputs that are observable or can be corroborated by observable market data for substantially the full terms of the assets or liabilities.

Level 3 - Unobservable inputs for assets or liabilities. Unobservable inputs should be used to measure the fair value to the extent that observable inputs are not available.

**Property and Equipment**

Purchased property and equipment are recorded at cost. Donated property and equipment are stated at estimated fair market value when received. Depreciation and amortization are recorded using the straight-line method over estimated useful lives ranging from three to five years. The Project's policy is to capitalize long-term asset expenditures in excess of \$1,000.

**Grants and Contributions**

Grants and contributions, including unconditional promises to give, are recorded as made. All grants and contributions are available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor. Unconditional promises to give that are expected to be collected within one year are recorded at net realizable value. Unconditional promises to give that are expected to be collected in future years are recorded at the present value of their estimated future cash flows. Conditional promises to give are not included as support until the conditions are substantially met.

**Donated Services and Goods**

Donated services are recognized as contributions, if the services (a) create or enhance nonfinancial assets or (b) require specialized skills, that are performed by people with those skills, and that would typically need to be purchased if not provided by donation. During the year ended June 30, 2010, the value of contributed services included in the accompanying statement of activities amounted to \$3,250. Local arts and entertainment organizations and various corporations contributed \$144,660 in the fiscal year ended June 30, 2010 of donated tickets and entry fees and goods used for the benefit of the Project's clients.

A substantial number of volunteers have donated significant amounts of time in the Project's program services and development activities. During the year ended June 30, 2010, the Project had approximately 250 volunteers who provided in excess of 14,600 volunteer service hours. The value of these contributed services is not reflected in the financial statements because the criteria for recognition of such volunteer effort have not been satisfied.

**Functional Allocation of Expenses**

The costs of providing the various programs and activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of functional expenses. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited.

**Credit Risk**

Financial instruments that potentially subject the Project to concentrations of credit risk are primarily cash, investments and accounts receivable. The Project places its cash in financial institutions that are insured in limited amounts by the U.S. government.

**Use of Estimates**

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions. These estimates and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

**Income Tax Status**

The Project is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code and is exempt from California franchise taxes under Section 23701d of the Revenue and Taxation Code. It is the opinion of management that all income earned has been related to the Project's tax-exempt status and there has been no unrelated business income.

The accounting standard requires that a tax position be recognized or derecognized based on a "more-likely-than-not" threshold. Based on the management's analysis of the Project's tax positions, the accounting for any uncertainty in the Project's tax positions is not expected to have a material impact on the financial statements.

**6. OPERATING LEASES**

The Project rents two office spaces in San Francisco, on Polk Street and on Market Street. The Market Street location is rented on a month to month basis while the Polk Street location is rented under a lease agreement, renewed for 3 years on July 1, 2008. **12. ENDOWMENT**

The Project's endowment consists of \$25,000 of a donor restricted fund received in 2005. The donor requested that the Project should set up an endowment account and use the income from the endowment account for the LifeLines program.

The Board of Directors of the Project has interpreted the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act ("UPMIFA") as requiring the preservation of the original gift as the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Project classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment, (b) the original value of subsequent gifts to the permanent endowment, and (c) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument as the time the accumulation is added to the fund. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the Project in a manner consistent with the standard of prudence prescribed by UPMIFA.
