And in Shanti's case, change will result in increased services for Shanti clients, which is, of course, why we are here in the first place.

During the course of these changes, it is good to know that Shanti clients can continue to count on the "unchanging" support of our many donors and volunteers.

SHANTI RESTRUCTURES TO KEEP UP

WITH CHANGING CLIENT NEEDS

hanti Project recently announced a major restructuring and expansion of its Client Services Department. Beginning May 1, 1995, this expansion will provide a wider range of services to people with AIDS and disabling HIV disease.

The restructuring will incorporate all of Shanti's services and programs into a single effort. In addition to Shanti's longstanding core programs such as practical person with AIDS who may have various needs (Ed), she will schedule an intake for Ed. As part of the intake process one client record and a detailed service plan will be created, enabling Ed to access all the services he will need at Shanti, and elsewhere, through a single intake process.

Ed's needs may include a support volunteer (Bill), rides to medical appointments (through Shanti's Van Program),

and mental health and/or substance abuse assessment (an outside referral made by Sandy). His case worker Sandy, his new volunteer Bill, and other program staff join with Ed as his 'support team'.

This team approach helps ensure that clients can access all the services they need. Also, Shanti volunteers will be able to provide

more complete support to their clients as part of the client support team.

The expansion will also help ensure Shanti's ability to remain true to its mission to enhance the quality of life and independence for people with HIV disease while reducing their need for institutional care. Shanti's commitment to providing support services in a non-judgemental, client-focused manner also remains the same.

And, of course, Shanti volunteers and donors will continue to play a critical role in Shanti's ability to deliver quality services to people with AIDS and disabling HIV disease.



and emotional support, clients will now benefit from individual needs service plans tailored to their particular life situations. These service plans will include simplified client intake and assessment steps, client advocacy, information & referral services, and crisis intervention services as needed.

This restructuring also includes the transfer of HIV service provision in the Tenderloin from AIDS Indigent Direct Services, Inc. (A.I.D.S.) to Shanti, which enables Shanti to provide even more services to our current Tenderloin clients.

For example, if a Shanti case worker (Sandy) is in the Tenderloin and meets a

SHANTI ANNOUNCES NEW DONOR RECOGNITION PROGRAM

hanti Project recently announced a new recognition program for major donors. The program, entitled the Circle of Light Major Donor Program, was launched at a reception hosted by Tim Hanlon, Vice President at Wells Fargo Bank.

The purpose of the program is to recognize those individuals, corporations, founda-

tions and other organizations who have made significant contributions to Shanti Project.

The logo for this new permanent program, shown here, uses the corona, the circle of light surrounding an eclipse which symbolizes Shanti's belief that even in darkness there are rays of hope.

Shanti's Circle of Light members help provide such hope to our friends and neighbors affected by HIV. Without their support, Shanti would not be able to continue to provide critically-needed support services to people with AIDS and disabling HIV in San Francisco.

At the inaugural event, held on March 9, 1995 at the Wells Fargo Bank penthouse, Shanti major donors were inducted as charter members into the program. Charter members are defined as individuals and organizations who have contributed \$1,000 or more to Shanti in any given year. Member's aggregate contributions determine the appropriate gift circle for each donor. Gift circles range from \$1,000 to the \$250,000 Lifetime Circle of Light.

New members can join Shanti's Circle of Light Major Donor Program by contributing at least \$1,000 to Shanti in any calendar year. Each year, each Shanti major donor's aggregate contributions will be tabulated, and donor circle listings will be updated.

14/4. THE SHANTI PROJECT WAS FOUNDED IN KELEY BY DR. CHARLES GARFIELD TO PROVIDE SUPPORT FOR PEOPLE WITH TERMINAL ILLNESSES: THE NAME IS A LOOSE TRANSLATION OF A SAN-SKRIT WORD MEANING "INNER PEACE." THE SAN FRANCISCO DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH CONFIRMED THAT 36 MEN HAD BEEN DIAG-NOSED WITH GRID, GAY RELATED IMMUNE DEFICIENCY, THE FIRST DESCRIPTION OF THE SYN-DROME NOW KNOWN AS AIDS. ONE YEAR LATER, SHANTI VOLUNTEERS BEGAN PROVIDING SERVICES FOR MEN WITH GRID. 1987, SHANTI MOVED TO

SAN FRANCISCO. 1983, THE PROJECT OPENED A COUNSELING SERVICE AT SAN FRANCISCO GENERAL HOSPITAL'S WARD SA, THE NATION'S FIRST AIDS WARD; AIDS MONEY FROM THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO BECAME SHANTI'S MAIN SOURCE OF SUPPORT. 1444 SHANTI CHANGED ITS FOCUS TO PROVIDE SER-VICES TO PEOPLE WITH AIDS AND HIV, THE VIRUS THAT CAUSES AIDS. BIRING ITS 20-YEAR HISTO-RY, SHANTI HAS TRAINED MORE THAN 7,000 VOL-UNTEERS WHO HAVE GIVEN OVER 2 MILLION HOURS OF SERVICE TO BAY AREA RESIDENTS.
